22/6/41.

Dear Joyce and Dad,

I am sending you a "Gift Food Parcel" this week from one of the big stores in the nearest civilised town. I did not know that I could do this until I saw it advertised in the paper. This store makes up 3 different types of parcels and includes postage.

- (a) 2 lb tea, and 1 large tin of butter 13/-
- (b) 2 lb tea, 1 small tin of butter, and 1 lb cube sugar 12/-
- (c) 1 lb tea, 2 lb cube sugar and 1 lb steak and kidney puddings. The shop can make up a special parcel for me.

I shall send you "c" owing to the fact that meat is your chief difficulty and that the other parcels have 1 lb of tea and I think that 1 lb tea will be sufficient. Please let me know as soon as possible that you receive it O.K.

I tried to send the parcel off yesterday but the shop was closed as it was Saturday afternoon. I saw Carole Lombard and Robert Montgomery in "Mr and Mrs Smith" yesterday and thoroughly enjoyed a good comedy.

Did I tell you but whilst we are up country every week we get a free issue of 40 fags and 2 boxes matches — or 2 oz tobacco and 2 boxes matches. Being a non-smoker you have no idea how popular I a

when I draw my ration.

I will try and send you a "gift food parcel" as often as I can manage so in the circumstances will you please send me £1 postal order per month to enable me to do this. Please send postal order and not currency notes as the latter are very hard to change.

I have stopped sending my letters to you by air mail for the following reasons. Previously they were flown to Durban and thence by surface mail but this has now been cancelled and the only air mail service available now is by American Clipper and costs too much. (two dollars).

Whilst I remain up country I am attached to 11th Indian Divisional Signals but I'm hoping to go back to my old unit soon and the sooner the better.

For Christmas greetings I hope to send a cables to you, Auntie Lizzie, Uncle Jack and Uncle Charlie but don't tell them in case something pops up and prevents my doing so.

Some mail arrived yesterday but there was none for me and I expect mine is wandering round Malaya trying to find me. Flowers I have complained to the Army Post Office and the Company Office so perhaps it may reach me a bit sooner than heretofore.

I went out driving a 15 cwt truck today for an hour. I was taken to an airfield under construction so I couldn't hit anything which was a good idea. However as it was my first attempt I didn't do at all bad and thoroughly enjoyed myself tearing round the field and I didn't smash the truck up much to my surprise!!!

If you see one fairly reasonable don't you think it would be a good idea to buy a big carpet for the drawing room. I think it would be look a lot better don't you but unfortunately they aren't very reasonable. How is the wireless going P.C.K. I hope.

The last letter I received from you was March 22 so there's been wandering round trying to find me which I hope will be soon now that I've complained. The trouble is my unit haven't readressed my letters to my temporary station here up country and have merely sent the letters back to the nearest Army Post Office and have left it to the latter to sort out which I consider very unsatisfactory.

The climate here is slightly better than Singapore. One thing however about the camp; it is situated in a huge rubber plantation and consequently it is lovely and shady and ~~naturally~~ we don't notice the heat quite so much but even so its still too damned hot for my liking.

25/6/41

I received 2 letters from you to-day, Apr. 7 and Apr. 22 so therefore your letters of about March 24, April 1 and Apr. 15 haven't reached me yet. Your letter of April 22 contained Postal Order No W/2 014823 for £1; thanks very much. I'm glad the tennis club is to continue but please don't send any clothes etc. as I can buy them very cheaply here. I have only received 1 Barret Box since that very big bundle of than that you sent me yourself.

I went out driving this morning again. We

went to the airfield and I drove around on my own  
to-day without the instructor sitting by my side and  
I did O.K.

26/6/41

It's O.K. but I'm quite sober. I'm enclosing  
herewith the label off a beer bottle; as you can  
see for yourself it consists of a nice friendly tiger  
under a palm tree - two very common things in Mal.  
I went out driving again to-day. I drove along the  
main road for about 20 miles; the width of the  
main road is about enough room for 2 trucks to  
pass one another with less than 1ft to spare and is  
full of ordinary and Z bends and I did O.K. I hope  
to get a license next week but even so I shall have  
to have another test when I return to Singapore.

27/6/41

I'm sending you gift "Food Parcel "b" as the  
shop refused to make a special parcel for me; I expect  
you will have to pay duty your end; let me know  
if you receive it O.K. I will send you another  
in about 3 weeks as it is useless to send more than  
one parcel at a time in case the ship gets sunk. I  
drove about another 20 miles again to-day. The truck  
weighs 3 tons unloaded and 5 tons loaded but is  
called a 15 cwt truck. I went to the new canteen  
in the neighbouring village in the evening.

28/6/41

Hoped to have gone out driving again but had  
to clean truck instead because of inspection. To-day  
is Saturday and this afternoon I shall be "hitch hiking"  
to — to see some civilization. Food remains awful  
but consider myself lucky that I have the money to  
buy food outside the camp. Feeling very fit  
everything considered,
