### **EDITORIAL**

With the School again suffering from a premature slackening off after the rigours of examinations we must look to next year with great foreboding, for then the "A" levels start even earlier. It seems very wrong that the time left to us after the exams should be so wasted and, if it is to be worse in years to come, then there is an obvious need for a great deal of rethinking. In this term the School Societies are mostly inactive and it ought to be possible for Secretaries to put in a greater effort to rekindle interest after the end of examinations. Nevertheless, it would be wrong to suggest that everything is at a complete standstill, because a great deal of hard work is being put into making this year's School Fête and Dance an even greater success than last. A quick glance into the Prefects' Common Room reveals something more active than the usual railway waiting-room atmosphere and the great cluster of for once legally present bottles, almost totally untampered with, is indicative of several boys' devotion to their task. The proceeds from the Fête and Dance will go towards the Swimming Pool Fund, which now stands at £1,700.

This term, with cricket one of the few activities to compete successfully with examinations, we would like to congratulate R. M. Edrupt on again being chosen to play for the Middlesex 2nd XI; he played a number of matches for this team last season and consequently his name found its way into the present edition of Wisden. It is, we hope, not beyond the bounds of possibility that we shall someday hear the Hampshire burr of John Arlott curling itself around the surname of our 1st XI Captain.

Lastly, we should like to pass on some rather interesting information that came through the post, on awe-inspiringly magnificent paper, to the Editor. J. and J. ### **COMMON ROOM CHANGES**

This term witnesses a number of departures. Mr. Fairbairn has been teaching physics here since 1955. Mr. Gould has been given a year's leave of absence for professional studies, and his place will be taken by Mr. F. Bridges of Kingsbury County School and Trent Park College. ### LITERARY CONTRIBUTIONS

### OXFORD LETTER

Oxford is similar to other universities in at least one respect. It is a relatively closed community; it tends to isolate its members from the variety of cross-pressures which sooner or later facilitate the integration of individuals into society as a whole. Thus is explained the stress which is typically experienced during the adjustment process at the beginning of each vacation. Thus is also explained the patterning of behaviour along a few fairly distinctive lines of development. Once the individual has been "incorporated" into the comprehensive university system his behaviour is directed along a limited number of channels, and it is really only the emphases on each and within each that allow of any considerable degree of control by the individual personality.

The Elizabethan contingent at Oxford provides an interesting demonstration of this phenomenon rather than any notable exceptions. At the outset of their university careers freshmen are faced with a formidable obstacle in the form of Preliminary Examinations which must be passed. These occur after one, two, or three terms and, in that they occupy virtually all one's time and energy, they serve, together with the fact of physical separation from previous environments, to incorporate Thus A. K. Chesterton (St. Peter's), A. H. Dent (St. Catherine's), G. A. Kingston (Wadham), and P. A. Richards (St. Peter's) have all been forced to focus their attention almost exclusively upon the business of passing examinations . . . though I do believe that A. H. Dent did find time, during one period of slight inebriation, to make certain adjustments to the "facilities" on his staircase.

I suppose that individuality reaches its cyclical zenith in Oxford during one's second year when Schools appear remote and work inevitably eases off. Yet extra-mural tastes and predilections are still expressed within a framework of societies and typical activities which are oriented towards the University rather than to broader fields. N. J. Hacker (Merton) still hammers away with outdated socialist doctrines, using the Oxford University Liberal Club as his vehicle. R. D. Jennings (Christ Church) has reached the dizzy athletic heights of goalkeeping for the college 2nd XI and is more than likely to achieve the bright lights of 1st XI football before next season is out. B. A. Symons (Keble) left his mark in Oxford life during his term as chairman of the Joint Action Committee Against Racial Intolerance, Oxford University's very own, but toothless, Race Relations Board. R. G. Ware (Pembroke) turned his hand to the business side of his college's most recent dramatic effort.

He tried to explain to Your Correspondent why it was no reflection upon the business manager that the play in fact made a loss; but the point was not quite taken. Finally, P. G. Weston (Queen's) goes to parties ... which can be a full-time hobby for the Oxford undergraduate with a strong constitution and very dark shades.

One's third year in Oxford is characterized by the resurrection of the sort of compulsions towards conformative behaviour which further insulate the individual against diverse extra-university pressures. A feeling which lies somewhere between fear, guilt, and pride in achievement, and which is highly contagious, distorts one's concept of the Second Public Examination and exaggerates the importance of such nice distinctions as that between a "good 2nd" and a "not-so-good 2nd". Slowly the libraries become repopulated and girl friends are forced to wait until Friday night. Of course the process of adjustment to the pressure of Schools comes harder for some than for others. R. W. Beeny (Pembroke) had some difficulty getting used to the general atmosphere of the Bodleian and so broke himself in gently with twenty-minute-a-day acclimatization sessions earlier in the year. S. J. Bennett (Oriel) decided that the best way to fight the temptations of extra-curricular activities was to get married - on the principle that two consciences are better than one. R. W. Pullen (Lincoln), being blessed with a room in the centre of Oxford (rather than the normal far-flung digs), toyed seriously with the idea of installing a television set for the sake of his education — but was beaten by administrative problems. And J. S. Taylor (Exeter) was on several occasions moved to give up all forms of alcohol in the cause of clarity of thought but found it too big a price to pay.

Before concluding, passing reference must be made to the only true Oxford academics — the D.Phil students. Among their learned number is one Old Elizabethan, P. B. Sanders (Wadham), who is doing research into the life of the founder of the Basuto nation, wherever that

Oxford, then, tends to seal off its members and in this manner fairly rigidly to channel their activities. A consequence of this process is the apparent artificiality of Oxford life, especially as viewed from outside by those who are not implicated in the closed unit. Activities only appear meaningful to the extent that they relate with items of one's own experience. Oxford, being in a sense "cut off" from society as a whole is bound to appear unintelligible — even artificial or irrational — to those outside, just as does Masonic ritual. Fitting comment, maybe, on

The general standard of entries was also higher, so that the choice of prize-winners was not as predictable as

Second prize went to the Motor Club for renovating the Austin A30 that the Bursar has presented to the Club. S. V. Mears won the third prize in this section for his model aircraft. First prize in the Junior section went to B. J. F. Phillips and P. M. Evans for model slot-racing cars on a home-made track. It was obvious that much time and skill had gone into making this track, and these two boys should be given credit for not using the customary commercially manufactured article. J. A. Barton and I. K. Barton were second, with a display of model aeroplanes. In the Physics laboratory B. Garrard exhibited a television set, an oscillascope, and an amplifier which he had constructed: these won him third prize. M. J. Causebrook was highly commended for his scale model of the narrowgauge Ffestiniog Railway train

Throughout the evening popular music was played in the Hall. "Bach with a bite" was the title of the first session, presented by G. W. Davies (drums), A. K. Gray (pianoforte), and Mr. Crofts (bass). Other performers were A. J. Ayers, P. J. Skelton, and M. G. Langley (O.E.). The whole Exhibition was an undoubted success, and

### **FIVES**

The last three matches at the end of the season were all won, which was very pleasing. Mackay rose to the occasion to win their match as well in very fine style 7-12, 12-5, 2-12, 14-11, 12-4. They were particularly impressive in the fifth game. Our match record for the season was 5 victories and 4 losses, a great improvement on what was feared and at one time looked only too likely.

In the Public Schools Championship at Eton from

April 3rd, our second pair (R. A. Hallewell and A. Taylor) was beaten by St. Bees I in the first round, but Croft and Mackay, in fine form, enabled the School to reach the last sixteen for the second successive year. They beat Charterhouse II 12-7, 12-4 12-9, then Highgate IV 12-7, 14-15, 12-4, 12-7, and in Round 3 in ten glorious minutes they reached 10-5 against Eton I in the first game. They could not keep it up, and Eton I went on to win, and subsequently to take the trophy itself: but we had made our mark!

The season was a very successful one, despite our initial fears. We were fortunate in having available R. H. Croft to show the way. His play was often quite brilliant: next year we have to think of a team without a Croft — no present member of the School will know what this is like! M. N., D. J., and R. H. Croft have been the mainstay of our teams for so long — a quite outstanding contribution from one family to one particular sport, for which the School owes them much gratitude. Mackay and Hallewell were also awarded badges: A. Taylor came into the second pair when Worroll left. All three are much to be congratulated on their efforts.

The following is from the Adjudicator's notes made

during the proceedings:

BROUGHTON:

Choir. With a most competent accompanist and a very good conductor this choir could have been excellent, but rather lifeless singing and dull faces made it hard to believe that they were "bold Gendarmes". The sopranos had a lovely tone but were too light.

Orchestra. An attractive arrangement, making very good use of the instruments at their disposal (violin, clarinet, trombone, and cello). General effect was of sensitive and restrained ensemble playing.

UNDERNE:

Choir. A large choir, some of whom looked at the conductor, who did absolutely all that he could to help. First song had a pleasing blend of sound and some very good contrasts, but the second was less effective because the diction was less clear. Both songs most sympathetically accompanied at the piano.

Orchestra. Seemed a little too long because it lacked tonal variety and some over-anxiety led to rather rough treatment of the music. Nevertheless, many times when the teamwork and chording effects were

excellent.

LEICESTER: Choir. A good sized choir, but suffering from the lack of a conductor. A very refined version when really lusty singing was called for. The part-singing in the chorus was very effective.

Orchestra. A beautiful opening from the flute helped to inspire the sensitive playing which ensued, and the quality of tone produced by the clarinettist made the second movement particularly enjoyable. A polished performance.

STAPYLTON:

Choir. Rolling Down To Rio: Good unaccompanied singing is always attractive and this choir had very good diction and attack. The song could have been sung with much greater abandon. Loch Lomond: Less successful because out of time but the chorus actually became rousing — unfortunately, this song is a lament!

Orchestra. The highlight of the afternoon. The clarinettist's restraint made for an unobtrusive blend with the two violins whose intonation was almost faultless. The precision of the string playing, their perfect timing of bowing on chords, their excellent interplay, and above all their style of performance made me want

to hear more.

HARRISONS:

Choir. A song which showed up well the light soprano voices, but a much too matter-of-fact interpretation. Missed many opportunities to vary both the tone and the speed which would have allowed for the Victorian pathos.

Orchestra. Despite the dignified trumpet, a general impression of scramble and the clarinettists grew very short of breath. United in the final notes to give a

controlled ending.

The adjudicator decided that Stapylton was the winner of the Competition, with Underne in second place. Miss Smith said what an enjoyable afternoon it had been and we would all like to thank her very much for her informative and sympathetic adjudication.

There was a long discussion on the question of the draft scheme proposed by the Minister of Education and Science for the Q.E. Endowment Fund. Mr. F. W. The Association Committee had already made it clear to the Minister that they approved the draft scheme as drawn, but was concerned at the proposals of the London Borough of Barnet to secure the right to appoint a majority of the fourteen trustees at the expense of other interested parties such as the O.E. Association, the Old Girls' Guild, the University of London and the Herts. County Council. The report was adopted nem. con

Mr. E. N. H. Shearly criticised the high cost to the Association (about £180 p.a.) of printing its quota of the "Elizabethan". The Committee agreed to look into this in conjunction with the School with a view to reducing the expense by the introduction of advertising matter or by other means.

After the inevitable protest by Mr. M. J. Chapman concerning the Association's holding of 3½% War Loan stock, the meeting proceeded with the more serious business of choosing its officers for 1967-8 and the following elections were made:

S. McGreal, B. L. McKean, J. McKean and P. Treby. The first club evening was held at the Singing Kettle Café on 1st October, 1946. For the first two seasons the Club met at this Café on Tuesday evenings from October to March. In 1948 a change was made, the new venue being The Olde Tea Shoppe on Friday evenings. The Club moved to its present H.Q., The Devon Café, in 1952.

The Club played ten matches in the first season, six were friendly and four were for the Montague-Jones Board, the minor club competition run by the Hertfordshire Chess Association.

In 1947, the Barnet & District Chess Association was formed due in no small measure to the efforts of Mr. Woodland assisted by J. McKean. The Club has taken part in the league run by the Association since its foundation.

Due to its Barnet League commitments, the Club dropped out of the Montague-Jones Board competition in 1948 but re-entered in 1956 and competed annually until 1964 when once again circumstances compelled us to withdraw.

In 1952 we entered the Hertfordshire Chess Association's major club competition for the Puller Cup. The Club has competed for the cup every season since then, winning it twice, in the 1957/58 and 1961/62 seasons.

Since 1946 about 100 O.E's have played for the Club, many of them, alas, for only two or three matches each. On the other hand, S. R. Capsey has well over 300 match games for the Club to his credit.

Mr. Woodland has been the Club's chairman since its re-formation and other notable office bearers have been J. McKean, B. L. McKean (secretary for five seasons), Maj.-Gen. S. Moore-Coulson, R. F. Griffiths (the present champion of South Africa), J. D. Marsh (treasurer for six seasons) and S. R. Capsey (match captain for seven seasons).
