FOOTBALL SEASON 1941-42 — RETROSPECT.

A splendid season. Indeed, the best the school has ever had as to results.

Results are not everything: even better were the general soundness of the play and the general keenness to get all the game that one could out of a match. The first fifteen had no very outstanding player as in some previous years, but the school has never had a side where the general level of play was so high, with so little sign of a weak link. Nearly all colours were given ere the season was half through. At last we had a pack, fairly fast and powerful, who could pass and dribble as well as do good work in tight and line out. Behind them there were orthodox backs who sent the ball out to the wings and kicked good touches. Indeed, as all were good individual runners, one wished they had manoeuvred a little more in midfield; too often the ball reached the wing with no real opening made. Yet centres who *always* try to break through are a nuisance, and our backs certainly always gained ground and so helped their pack. Only one school match (St. Albans) was lost; the victories included St. George's (Harpenden), Bedford Modern, Watford Grammar, Royal Masonic and Haberdashers' Schools, and Eltham College; the draw was against Bancroft's

Equally pleasing were the fine results of the second fifteen. This was not as good as last year's side, in that it was less even. The first few players on the list might well have been in the first in many seasons: the last few, though deserving their colours, were as yet only ordinary. But all played really good football, and had an admirable captain in Blewett.

The third fifteen, led by Alwin, was better than its results imply. For it must be noted that two of its losses were against 1st XV's of other schools, and also that it suffered cumulatively from the calls of 1st and 2nd in a season not at all free from crockings.

Finally, equally hearty congratulations are due to the unbeaten 1st Colts. The forwards were unusually tiny, and must put on some beef if we are not to have an odd 1st XV in a couple of seasons. But they were a willing lot, and had a strong running back division to do the scoring for them.

Altogether, a season worth striving to equal in the future.

As to the Senior House Matches, it was a pity that the long spell of snow caused them to be played at the first opportunity, before anyone had the least chance of practice. Yet play was better than one expected. In the semi-final there was a keen game between Underne and Leicester. Underne were just about worth their three-point win, though Leicester almost saved the game through Hughes and Mortimer in the closing minutes. The other match was won by Stapylton, comfortably, though Broughton put up quite plucky resistance. Stapylton went on to win the final. Pay, Hall, Blewett, and Sterry played good football for the losers, but the strength of the Stapylton backs was decisive.

FIRST XV CHARACTERS.

D. McN. WILSON (*Captain, Colours 1940-1-2*).—At first seemed worried by the Captaincy and his play was affected. But soon was leading the side really well. A hard worker, and "finished" in all branches of forward play. Crocked for some matches.

F. B. STITT (*Deputy-Captain, Colours 1939-40-1-2*).—Led the side very well when called on. Powerful and experienced forward, invaluable in tight and line-out, and would be a class player with more pace in the loose.

P. B. MORTIMER (*Colours 1940-1-2*).—Experienced and vigorous forward. Good in line-out and breaking away from loose scrums. Also did a lot of covering, and kicked well.

D. E. A. POWELL (*Colours 1940-1-2*).—Centre three with a beautiful swerve, good defence, and a fine touch-finder. Place kicking variable. Had patches of bad judgment, but his best was very good.

T. W. F. PAY (*Colours 1941-2*).—Young forward with promise of "class." Hard worker in the tight, and shows real dash, both in attack and defence, in the loose.

J. MOYES (*Colours 1941-2*).—Another good all-round forward who played dependable football, and can lead a pack.

B. W. RICHARDS (*Colours 1941-2*).—Young forward of much promise; good in tight, with pace and opportunism in the loose. Can improve his kicking, and must beware of excessive winging when in the back row.

E. W. TARBOX (*Colours 1941-2*).—A powerful striking force and frequent scorer. Strong running wing, with adequate pace, sound defence, and was unusually consistent in his play.

P. A. WARD (*Colours 1941-2*).—Last year's fly, but played on the wing. Has speed, a good swerve, and handles and kicks well, yet did not always make the most of his chances—which were fewer than they should have been. Crooked for several matches.

P. F. WALPOLE (*Colours 1941-2*).—Centre three with considerable dash and anticipation, but does not use these to make openings for his wing. Should increase his swerve and learn to pick up on the run.

B. F. EDWARDS (*Colours 1941-2*).—Keen little forward; and fine hooker.

R. J. COOPER (*Colours 1941-2*).—Young fly-half of orthodox type, with very promising judgment, and good kicker. Must learn to make actual openings, and to move as fast when doing so as he does when going through on his own.

S. K. HALL (*Colours 1941-2*).—Hard working, but rather light and slow, back row forward, clever with his feet. Should cultivate the strength to pack in the front row.

G. B. HANSON (*Colours 1941-2*).—Full back with pretty good positioning and defence. Kicking uncertain, though improved. His chief assets were his pace and ability to make a dashing and unexpected run.

C. G. KING.—Came into the side at half-term. Elephantine scrum half. Rather slow, but made up for this by length and accuracy of pass, and by clever working of the blind side with Tarbox.

SECOND XV CHARACTERS.

A. H. BLEWETT (*Colours 1940-1-2*).—Useful scrum half, but soon moved to fill a gap at centre three, where he showed determination and a sound sense of the game. An excellent captain.

R. J. B. THURGOOD (*Colours 1940-1-2*).—Keen and good scrum half, who would have kept his place in the 1st with a stronger pass-out.

P. S. MCGREAL (*Colours 1940-1-2*).—Stylish and promising centre, but liable to put mere cleverness and tricks before essentials.

J. C. OPPERMAN (*Colours 1941-2*).—Heavy forward. Good in loose and line-out, but could improve his packing. Played some useful games in the first.

D. C. NEWELL (*Colours 1941-2*).—Also filled a gap in the first with credit. Hard-working forward with good style.

B. R. H. SCARLETT (*Colours 1941-2*).—Improved fly-half; quick off the mark with good hands and fair kicking, he needs only more sense of making the actual opening.

R. M. TILLER (*Colours 1941-2*).—Keen forward of slowish type. Useful place kick.

N. T. HUGHES (*Colours 1941-2*).—Plucky wing who has come on a lot, and played one or two useful games in the first.

M. A. WHEELANS (*Colours 1941-2*).—Forward of bustling type, and fairly good leader.

H. C. LUDWIG (*Colours 1941-2*).—Rather raw forward, but keen and may be good.

P. J. KERSHAW (*Colours 1941-2*).—Very earnest forward who packs badly, but is good in the loose.

G. P. SONNEX (*Colours 1941-2*).—Fast and determined wing with expensively weak hands, and uncertain defence.

K. F. MORRISON (*Colours 1941-2*).—Concentrated on hooking, with good success.

R. C. MARLOW.—Heavy forward, but his play is much too sluggish.

J. WELLS.—Plucky full-back with good sense of position, but a bit slow and tries to kick an excessive length.

There also played on several occasions: G. J. Alwin, an orthodox scrum half; J. L. W. Lister, a useful wing who would have been in the side in most years; E. P. Bull, an earnest forward; and G. G. Allen, full-back.

1st XV v. WATFORD GRAMMAR SCHOOL. On Stapylton. December 3rd. Won 27—6.

Only too often this particular game has been spoiled for us by crockings before or during the match. This year Watford had the bad luck, and we won by a goal, a dropped goal, and six tries, owing to our superiority forward. The conditions were not so greasy as to excuse the number of chances missed by the backs, where the halves were quite good, and Powell and Tarbox (after a bit) very good, but Walpole, except for engineering a fine try in the second half, spoiled the line by working on some heretical principles of his own. When the forwards' hearts must just about have been breaking at the way their work was being wasted, Cooper opened the score with a dropped goal. Then Tarbox got away and sent in King, Hanson got over on the blind side, and Richards scored after he and Wilson had backed up a long dribble by Tarbox. Watford also got a good try. After half time Powell, Walpole, Tarbox and Cooper scored, the try worked between Tarbox and Walpole from an unpromising position being the best. Mortimer was hurt a few minutes from the end and Watford attacked and got a penalty goal.

1st XV v. ROYAL MASONIC SCHOOL. On Stapylton. December 6th. Won 20—5.

As Mortimer, Richards, and Walpole had joined Ward among the crocks, this was a good win—though, naturally, team-work was a bit at fault sometimes and we owed more to individual play than usual. We had a blustering wind against us in the first half, so that the visitors pressed most of the time and tested our defence to the limit. But it held out—except once—and during our one period of attack Tarbox got away and was well supported by Hall and by King, who scored, and Tarbox himself went over on the blind side just afterwards. A lead even of one point at half time looked like a win, with the wind behind us in the second half; and so it proved. But our opponents went very hard, and were often on the attack; so the game was not one-sided. However, Pay scored twice from the line-out, and Tarbox and Hughes each scored with a long and excellent run. The halves had rather an off day, so had Powell as a place-kicker, though he was very good otherwise. Moyes, Pay and Wilson played perhaps their best this season, Stitt and Hall were also in form, and Hanson was sound at back in trying conditions.

1st XV v. ELTHAM COLLEGE. Away. December 13th. Won 17—6.

As we had several colours away, and had what bad luck there was in the play, it was a good win. Ward was back, in the relatively unusual position of centre, and as there was a high wind and the halves were off colour in the first half, our back play was patchy. Powell ran right through the centre at once, and though he delayed his final pass too long, Tarbox went over on the blind side. Good kicking by Powell returned us to the attack and Tarbox got another blind side try. Then we had a long bad patch in which the attacking was poor in the centre and, as they pressed continually against the wind, Eltham seemed likely to win. But eventually Pay made a fine break away, Tarbox scored from a round of passing, and Powell got over in the best bit of play in the match. We thereupon gave away a try, just upon half-time. At the start of the second half some good back play was followed by a fine forward rush and a try by Pay. Then Eltham used the wind and pressed hard and well; but the defence was steady, especially Hanson, and they scored only once. Ten minutes from the end a great run by Tarbox all but brought a try, we continued plainly on top, and would have scored several times with better judgment. Stitt led the side in Wilson's absence and was well supported by Pay, Moyes, and Richards forward, and Powell and Tarbox outside.

1st XV v. OLD ELIZABETHAN R.U.F.C. On Stapylton. December 20th. Won 6—3.

Stitt again led in Wilson's absence; otherwise we were back at full strength; but we did not play well. Miles out-hooked Edwards, but the heeling was slow, with too much winging by our back row, and a lot of spoiling and scrambling round the scrum. And when the ball did get out, on either side, if one player didn't drop it, or do the wrong thing, the next one did; while there was a lot of inaccurate kicking. Territorially we had much the best of things except for the first few minutes of each half, and in that sense deserved to win; in another sense we didn't, for the O.E.s were one short throughout, so to win by a mere penalty was not very glorious. The O.E.s started with some fierce attacks, and a good round of passing sent Vincent over. Some good passing among our forwards put us on the attack, and Tarbox scored with a typical run. For the rest of the

half both sides relied on the punt ahead (of the aimless type). In the second half Powell made one brilliant opening out of nothing, only to see it wasted, and it was typical of the match, that the very easy penalty kick had to hit a post before it went over. Still, the game was in the best spirit, and the players seemed to enjoy it.

SCHOOL SOCIETY.

Despite various demands upon our time this term, all sections have been carried on vigorously. Early in the term a party visited the premises of the *Evening Standard* and later on those of the London School of Printing. Unfortunately, the numbers of these parties have to be considerably restricted.

THE AEROMODELLING GROUP. Meetings of this society have been fewer this term, although some more indoor flying has been attempted with some startling models, which have given some even more startling performances. Most members are now busily occupying their spare time in finishing models which they hope to fly in the coming summer.

SPOTTERS' CLUB. Although the Spotters' Club has not been quite so active this term as last, four successful meetings have been held. On March 2nd Mr. Strugnell gave members a very interesting account of his flying experiences during the last war. Other lectures have been given by P. R. Ward, who spoke on "Russian Types," and A. R. Downie, whose subject was "Flying-Boats." P. R. Ward has also drawn several posters, which have ably advertised the club's activities. The club is now starting a new series of talks on the 'planes produced by the leading British and foreign firms. In the first of these the early De Havilland designs were dealt with. The club has also achieved distinction outside the School, as three of its members, representing Club No. 168 of the N.A.S.C., have won the trophy presented to the best team in the London Civil Defence Region. Finally, our thanks are due to Mr. Smith and Mr. Normanton for presiding over our meetings, and to Mr. Pearce, who has arranged that the Lecture Theatre is free for us on Mondays.

PHOTOGRAPHIC SOCIETY. The term opened with a general meeting of the society, at which we were pleased to see several new faces. It was decided to hold fortnightly meetings. Mr. Chirgwin on January 20th gave an interesting account of his holidays in Switzerland, which he illustrated by projecting his own photographs on the screen. J. Sterry was elected to the committee. The outstanding event in the photographic term was the work undertaken by the committee during the local Warship Week. They worked very hard in turning out portraits of nearly a third of the school; the entire proceeds were sent to swell the school's

collection for Barnet's Minesweeper. Figures are not to hand at the time of going to press, but the effort has certainly proved well worth while. Next term the Hockett Cup Competition is held. The Easter holidays should give photographers of the School ample time in which to prepare their entries, and competition shou'd be keen. The society has a reasonable supply of materials, so that those who are less fortunate are not prevented from doing their best. So let no one waste the opportunity!

PHILATELIC SOCIETY. This group was restarted this term under the presidency of Mr. Winter, and regular meetings have been held. At each meeting there is a short talk, usually given by one of the members, followed by general exchange and discussion. This term Mr. Winter gave a general talk on "Stamp Collecting," J. G. Woods a talk on "Scandinavian Stamps," and A. R. Obrist an interesting address on "Swiss Stamps." Further meetings have been arranged for this term, and all boys interested in stamp collecting will be welcome.

NAUTICAL SOCIETY GROUP. Two very interesting lectures were delivered by F. B. Stitt and Mr. R. M. Cocks. The latter, who has done much work for the society, will be missed by all. However, Mr. Smith is warmly welcomed as his successor, and further lectures are being arranged for the near future. It is hoped to adopt a merchant ship under the auspices of The British Ship Adoption Society.

MUSICAL SOCIETY.

Though the ordinary choral and concert work of the Society is perforce in abeyance for various war reasons, our thanks are due to Mr. Pearce and Miss Hobbs for keeping music alive among us through a Musical Appreciation Group and a Music Club—which are likely shortly to merge. (Those interested in music, whether as listeners or performers, are welcomed.) The latter group has made a start with request programmes of gramophone records: the former has held a number of meetings. One of these was a recital of gramophone records lent by P. S. McGreal, another came through the borrowing from the County Record Library of the Kretzner Sonata and a number of Chopin Waltzes. This group particularly thanks Mrs. Sly for her willing co-operation.

But the most important musical event was a piano recital, very generously given in Hall by Miss M. Harlow-Robinson. Some sixty fellows heard a fairly varied programme of nine pieces—including the Pathétique Sonata, and Chopin's Grand Polonaise, for the lengthy items, and a Liszt-Paganini study for the pure lovers of technique. Perhaps a Brahms Intermezzo, the Scriabin Nocturne for left hand, and, above all, a Rachmaninoff Prelude (*not* in C# minor) were the most memorable things in a delightful afternoon.

Further recitals and our own library of records are more than a possibility.

Two papers were read this term; the first, prepared by J. L. Rodger, was on "Religious Instruction in Schools," and he advocated that the fundamentals of religion should be presented without prejudice, and that Christianity should be taught on a non-sectarian basis. The second discussion was based on two papers on "How Sunday is observed," by R. J. Cooper, and on "How Sunday should be Observed," by C. Bedwell, and on an impromptu talk by B. W. The Reverend A. M. Chirgwin, M.A., gave the School an interesting lecture on "Africa," illustrated by his own slides. There also came to us Mr. W. G. OBITUARY.

Sergt. John Stewart Brownell, R.A.F.V.R. (1931-37), has been killed in action while on duty as wireless operator and gunner in a bomber. He left School when in the sixth and, though not outstanding, was universally liked and respected as a fellow who could be relied upon to put his back in all that he did. He joined the R.A.F.V.R. before the War when he was eighteen, and had seen a large variety of service. When killed, he was on the eve of being commissioned; and his Commanding Officer writes of his general popularity and dependability, adding "the country has lost a gentleman and a great officer."

The death of Licut. Roy Maurice Wright, R.N.V.R. (1933-36), posted missing some months ago, is now confirmed. He had been mentioned in despatches in these terms: "This brave officer by his steadfastness, enterprise and resource did much to help his fellows in a hazardous operation in Greek waters." At School he was a popular and prominent figure—a sub-prefect, a First XV colour as centre three-quarter, and a First XI colour for his daring fielding close to the wicket. Our sympathy goes especially to the wife whom he had so recently married.

We have just heard of the death, some while ago, of J. S. Pugh (1925-31). He left school young, but had already made his mark both in work and the fifteen, as well as in character. A conscientious objector, working on the land, we hear he gave his life in an Air Raid, successfully shielding, with his own body, a man who was wounded and helpless.

We regret to state that Bombardier K. H. Kemp (1922-1927), who was an A.A. gunner on a torpedoed merchant ship, is missing.

FROM THOSE SERVING.

We are proud to hear that H. G. Holmes (1927-33) won the D.S.M. for gallantry at the battle of Cape Matapan.

Of past masters, Mr. Lace visited us, proud in the possession of a new daughter, but angry at the large amount of leave he had received! Capt. Gover writes that he is now at an A.A. Practice Camp, with N.C.O.s who are graduates, and he imagines "times are fairly hard at school with everything to be done and no one to do it." Capt. O. M. Mathews writes that he has been on a variety of courses and jobs, largely advanced instructing, "back to the old racket again." In Blackpool he met Flight Lieut. D. L. Hughes: "It shook me a bit when I realized that I taught him arithmetic in the Second Form!" He also met Mr. Murray and got a lot of news of the School from him. Aircraftman Timson, writing from Pershore, seems to have spent a variety of short spells in a variety of stations: training originally for a policeman, he got withdrawn from this unhappy lot on the grounds of sight, "it being dangerous for such unpopular creatures as policemen to wear spectacles," and, at the time of writing, was with three other schoolmasters "in an orderly room where I do things that an average third form boy would do quite well."

The Clerk to the Governors (Capt. F. W. Jefferies, O.E.) writes a Christmas letter from Bermuda: "Very pleasant for a holiday in peace time with pockets well lined. Very picturesque, with a pleasant climate except that from June to September is rather like the hot part of a Turkish Bath—the slightest effort, even an attempt to think, produces streams of perspiration. Strangely enough lots of exercise is the secret—we played tennis till we nearly dropped and alternated that with sea bathing. The latter is had to perfection, either from natural pools in the rock, or from delightful sandy beaches, with water crystal clear, ten to fifteen degrees warmer than in England under a late August sun. We meet a lot of 'cousins' with whom we get on well. An important side of my work is legal and so I keep my hand in for the piping days of peace. My last case, which took two days for argument, and finished with a long considered judgment delivered several days later, consisted of a soldier endeavouring to walk out of a sentence by presenting a petition to the Supreme Court of Bermuda for the issue of a writ of Habeas Corpus. During my reading I've always found that a *rara avis* spoken of only with bated breath, but it suddenly descended on me

from heaven in very solid form. The soldier still languishes in the jug—the petition being very properly dismissed.” He ends by rejoicing that the A.T.C. is flourishing, as it will be a help to hundreds of O.E.s. “Good luck to it and its officers.”

Aircraftman E. J. Mansfield also sent a Christmas letter, from Alberta, hoping he will “not be forced to miss too many Founder’s Days. The Canadian people are astonishingly hospitable, and one finds it hard to realize that there is a war on, what with the gaily lit streets, the abundance of food, and only friendly aircraft in the sky—add to this the nearness of the wonderful scenery of the Canadian Rockies. Irony of fate that I, who should be fighting for England’s freedom, should be evacuated far from hostilities.” He adds that he is taking many photos and that he met Marriott (L.A.C.) and two other O.E.s in Saskatchewan, and wants to be remembered to all who knew him.

Sergt. S. C. Paterson, R.A.S.C., from a big depot, says that after various vicissitudes at the hands of various sergeant-majors, in various places, he has been fixed for a year and is Orderly Room Sergt. “doing my best to please the commandant and adjutant most of the day. I work reasonably hard from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m., but we have considerable social amenities. I cannot play Rugger because I cannot get off duty on a Saturday afternoon, and content myself with being a member of the Dramatic Society here. One of our officers is Capt. Bray Wyndham—of Wyndham’s Theatre, etc.—and I have had no end of pleasure in acting with him and receiving direction from so brilliant a man. I have been more than interested in the doings of O.E.s and I have found the “Elizabethan” so very interesting, especially during the last two years when it has been almost impossible to keep in touch with all one would wish to. Please remember me to all my friends. We are all looking forward to the time when we meet again and continue where we left off in 1939.”
