## PHOTOGRAPHIC SOCIETY.

" Old Elizabethians'" Annual Dinner.
The third annual gathering of "Old Boys" took place at Wood's Hotel, Furnival's Inn, on the evening of what may be called New Foundation Day, viz., Thureday, May 3, being the anniversary of the re-opening of the School under the new scheme in 1875. The chair was occupied by Dr. T. W. H. Spicer, one of the earliest alumni of the revived school, who was supported by the Head Master, by the Chairman and Hon. Secretary of the Governors, by some former masters, among whom we were glad to recognize the weli-known faces of the Rev. R. A. Meaden and the Rev. H. W. P. Stevens, by Mr. Milne, of Hadley (who has been nominated by Kings' College as a governor under the new
scheme) and other friends of the school. There was also a goodly gathering of the chairman's old schoolfellows, though not so many as we hope to see in future years. The following is the programme of the proceedings:-Toast, "The Queen and Royal Family," the Chairman, the National Anthem; toast, "Queen Elizibeth," the Chairman; song, Mr. J. H. French ; toast, "The Head Master," Mr. E. Dale; response, Rev. J. B. Lee; song, Mr. H. E. Weatherley; song, Mr. Taylor ; toast, "The Governors,' Rev. R. A. Meaden ; response, H. E. C. Stapylton, Esq.; duet (flute and violin), Messrs. J. H. and R. H. French; song, Mr. Sawyer; toast, "The Sshool," Mr. Brown; response, Mr. II. W. Bryant; song, Mr. F. C. Warren; toast, "The Visitors," Mr. M. Church; response, Mr. Milue; song, Mi. E. Dale; toast, "The Chairman," Mr. A. Ritchie; song, Mr. Weatheriey. We hear that there were unusual obstacles to be overcome this year in the preparation for this festiva oscasion, and accordingly all the more praise is due to the committee, of whom Mr. T. Samuels, jun., acted as hon. secretary, for the very enjoyable evening which they succeeded in arranging.

Steeplechase, April 16th. -The course for the steeplechase was over an excellent line of country, shaped like a moon in its third quarter, so that by standing at the finish the run was to be seen almost from end to end. Starting from Gannic Corner the pack of sixteen, led by Nixon and Britten, kept well together down a ploughed field, over the first water jump, past the spinney, and over a stiff hedge; after a slightly up hill run they passed into a ploughed field, where the pace and the ground, rendered unusually heavy by the recent rains, began to tell on the weaker vessels, the more so as they were now mounting an awkward hill. This was the critical fart of the run, and the five (Nixon, Britten, Havinden, Samuels, and Ballance) who got to the front had
little chance of being caught again. After some pretty timber-topping near Gannic Lane the lot disappeared over the brow of the hill; thirty seconds went by and Nixon and Britten were again in sight, the former running well, though with his head drooping ; Havinden soon appeared, closely pressed by Samuels and Ballance, the rest coming along at rare intervals. After a few grass fields and some timber the course was over a cinder path near Beech Hill, here the pace was excellent, all the leading set running strongly, Havinden coming up to Britten, who was racing pluckily with Nixon; then over an ugly water-jump, Nixon showing the way up a hill, and the New Station Road was joined, leere the first man got well away, and turning into the straight (120), spurted magnificently for the finish at Camlot Stables. Thirteen seconds afterwards Havinden taped, ten yards separating him from Britten.

At the end of the Lent term a musical and dramatic entertainment was given in the School Hall in aid of the field fund, the debt on which has been gradually assuming serious dimensions. In spite of the very bad weather the hall was well filled, the audience frequently testifying to their delight by prolonged applause. The Choral Society opened the entertainment with Farmer's "Nursery Rhymes;" the glees "Sweet and low," Barnby; "Oh, hush thee, my baby," Sullivan; "Who killed Cock Robin," Pearsall; and "Hark, the vesper hymn," were also creditably executed during the evening. The fellows showed to most advantage in the two last part songs; the lack of tenor and bass somewhat diminished the effect of the others. Mr. Alleroft sang " The Bedouin's Love-song," in his usual excellent mauner, gaining considerable applause. Newbery, who possesses a voice of unusual "timbre" for a boy, a voice not unlike a woman's contralto, sang very wall "Surely," and later a du9t "The Children's Home," with Price; both pieoes
were deservedly encored. Sir William Magnay recited the two humorous pieces "My wedding day," and "How we hunted a mouse;" both were loudly re-demanded. Ths duct " Love and War," by Cooke, was admirably rendered by Messrs. R. T. Cull and Walter Wells, and on being re-demanded part was repeated. Lacy's amusing farce, "A silent woman," kept the audience in a continued roar of laughter. Arthur Merton, a very conceited young bachelor, is engaged to Marianne Sandford, but his affection is somewhat damped oy a letter from her father telling him that Marianne is a most incessant talker. Arthur writes to Mr. Sandford making some disparaging remarks about a woman's tongue, and the letter falling into Marianne's hands, she determines to pay him out; she therefore pretends that an accident has left her deaf and dumb, and a highiy amusing scene ensues, in which Arthur makes love to her through ear-trumpets of wonderful and fearful shapes. After being tormented for some time he is compelled to wish that his fiancée had use of her tongue again, when Marianns discovers her trick, and " all ends happily." Miss Phillips made a charming "Marianne Sandford," Mr. C. Burne an excellent "Arthur Merton," and Mr. H. Milne a most amusing "Mr. Sandford."

## The Athletic Sports.

The sports were held on Saturday, June 9th, in very unfavourable weather. Notwithstanding the continuous rain during the morning, and the very threatening sky afterwards, there was a fair attendance of visitors. We are requested by the Games Committee to express its sincere thanks to all friends of the School who have so liberally supported the Athletics by sending prizes or donations. A glance at the balance sheet published in the present issue will show how much the Sports are dependent on external aid, and we venture to draw the attention of all members of the School to the importance of subscribing to their own games, and of entering freely for events, even if they appear to have no very obvious prospect of gaining a prize. The thanks of the School are especially due to Mr Kingsford, upon whom the whole of the labour of organization and arrangement of the Sports has fallen. Appended is the programme and prize list :-

Throwing the Cricket Ball, open (four entries).-1st prize, pair of pads, Leech, 75yds.; 2nd, cricket balls, Hart and Owen (equal), 72 yds .

Wide Jump, under 14 (five entries). -1st, cricket bat, V. Simons, 13ft. 5in.; 2nd, pewter, Field. Taylor worked hard for the second place, but was beaten by three inches.

Wide Jump, open (four entries).-1st, fish knife and fork, Owen ; 2nd, silver-mounted horn beaker, E. Hart. Distance, 17 ft . 2in. Owen jumped exceedingly well, winning easily by two feet.

Quarier Mile, under 14 (six etnries).-1st, cricket set, V . Simons; 2nd, cup, T. W. Stevens. The first two ran a neck race down the hundred, but Simons, who is slightly taller, drew ahead, winning by three yards.

Quarter Mile, open (five intries).-1st, cricket bat, Leach; 2nd, horn beaker, A. Havinden. Won cleverly by seven yards. Capital finish for second place. Time, 64 secs.

100 Yards, under 14 (len entries).-First Heat: 1st, Field; 2nd, Kemp; 3rd, Ottaway. Time, 13 3-5th sees. Second Heat: 1st, T. W. Stevens; 2nd, V. Simons; 3rd, Smith. Time, 13secs. Final Heat: 1st, cup, V. Simons; 2nd, flask, T. W. Stevens. Won by a head. Time 13 4-5th secs.

100 Yards, open (five entered, but only two competed).Hart quickly drew ahead of Leach, winning a Doulton jug and cups in $121-5$ th secs.

100 Yards, under 12 (fourteen entries). -First Heat: Ist, Clayton; 2nd, Goodship; 3rd, Fry. Time, 14 1-5th secs. Second Heat: Ist, C. Stevens; 2nd, Payne; 3rd, Blelloch. Time, 15secs. Final Heat: 1st, cup, Clayton; 2nd, pewter, Goodship. Time, $144-5$ th secs. In all three heats there were rare finisher.

High Jump, open.-1st, cup, Owen; 2nd, batting gloves, Simons. Height, $4 \mathrm{ft} .4 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{in}$.

High Jump, under 14.-1st, tennis racquet. V. Simons beat G. R. Ballance. Height, $3 \mathrm{ft} .7 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{in}$.

Egg and Spoon Race (twenty-two entries).-1st, opera glasses, Jarrett; 2nd, pewter, G. Deakin; 3rd, Doulton cup, M. Samuels.

150 Yards Mandicap, under 15 (twenty-seven entries).First Heat: 1st, T. Stevens (12yds.) ; 2nd, R. Roberts ( 23 yd s.) ; 3rd, Y. Simons (16yds.) Time, 19 1-5th secs. Second Heat: 1st, Kemp (13yds.) ; 2nd, S. Simons (2tyds.); 3rd, Taylor ( 5 yds. ) Time, 19 1-5th secs. Third Heat: 1st, Pearson (35yds.) ; 2nd, Clayton (2lyds.) ; 3rd, Miller $2 y d s$.$) Time, 183$-5th secs. Final Heat: 1st, cup, Pearson (35yds.) ; 2nd, flask, Clayton (21yds.) The limit man held his own, though the event was splendidly contested.

Sack race, open (sixteen entries).-1st, horn beaker, T. W. Stevens; 2nd, pewter, Crane; 3rd, Doulton Cup, C. Stevens. Though Crane fell at starting, he soon regained position and made a good race with T. W. Stevens.

220 Yards, undear 12 (eight entries).-1st, opera glasses, Fry; 2nd, Doulton mug, Goodship. An excellent race; passing the pavilion, Fry, a tall boy for his age, drew well to the front, maintained his lead down the hundred, winning by barely three yards, the other seven taped almost in a line.

Half-Mile Handicap (twenty-one entries).-1st, silver champagne cup, G. E. Havinden (122yds.) ; 2nd, clock, C. Stevens (l38yds.) ; 3rd, clock, Britten (46yds.) Perhaps the most exciting event of the day ; the winner soon showed to the front, and running with a regular stride all through, passed the tape a yard-and-a-half in front of Stevens.

120 Yards Hurdle Race, open (five entries). -Final heat: 1st, bat, Owen ; 2nd, racquet, A. J. Simons; Time, 20 2-5th secs.

Quarter-Mile Old Boys (eight entries).-1st, carriage clock, T. Samuels; 2nd, ornamental easel, A. Britten. Samuels and Britten drew away from the rest at the pond, and were not afterwards passed. Brumell, however, made Britten work hard for the second place.

One Mile, open (seven entries).- 1st, cup, Jarrett; 2nd cricket bag, Samuels, 5 min. 554 -5th secs. Jarrett kept the lead about a hundred yards until the last lap, when the lead was lessened by about fifty yards, twenty yards separating second and third. J. Britten at one time made good running, but spurted too soon, and was dead beat at the top of the hundred home.

Tug of War.-Six teams of seven each competed. After some excellent pulling, C team was declared the winner, A . J. Simons, Meacher, Holliday, Heath, Heriot, Pearson and Roberts each received a cricket ball.

Consoltaion Race.-Limited to boys who land competed in at least two recognised events, runs or jumps, and been unsuccessful. Prize winners Kemp and Blelloch.

The events having been disposed of, the prizes were gracefully distributed by Mrs Allcroft, each prize winner (especially those who were called to the prize table more than once) being heartily applauded by his schoolfellows. Samuels, as a winner of the old boys' race, was treated to quite an ovation.

During the afternoon a pleasing selection of music was performed by the band of the 7th Battalion, King's Royal Rifles.
