Those of us who paid our last tribute of respect to the memory of King Edward VII. will throughout a lifetime remember the deeply impressive Memorial Service which we attended in state at the Parish Church of Chipping Barnet. The Summer Term of 1910 will surely ever remain within our memories. As loyal subjects, too, we take this opportunity of declaring our unswerving allegiance to our new monarch, King George V., and his Consort, Queen Mary. May the new reign be long and prosperous!

The record of this term's cricket is most encouraging, and we can claim to have had an eleven considerably better than those which have represented the School for years. Not even the most optimistic amongst us could possibly accuse this year's team of being a really good batting side, but we have, on more occasions than not, been able to get out our opponents for a total that was within the scope of our batting powers. The chief factors in the success of the side have been the excellent captaincy and patient batting of W. Bearman; the bowling of G. Barber, C. C. Beazley, and W. H. Wall; the safe fielding of the team as a whole, and of D. L. Tucker in particular. Not many of our opponents can claim to have been allowed a second innings through a dropped catch, and the ground fielding has been good, if not brilliant. Of the younger members of the eleven, mention should be made of J. H. S. Matthews, who shows promise of good work next year.

The middle of July is hardly a seasonable period to discuss football, though one might have played in perfect comfort on one or two days of the present month. Another point that ought to be gratifying to us also is the proposed visit of Cambridge University to the School Ground on October

27th, their opponents being Hertfordshire. We have a lively recollection of the splendid football shown on the last occasion of a visit from Cambridge.

Mr. Coulton was educated partly abroad, and at London University, where he secured an honours degree. What we chiefly want is a regular succession of boys going up to the 'Varsity. Nothing could do more good to the School than this, and leaving exhibitions are sadly wanted to encourage this practice. When is the Old Elizabethan or Barnet Resident, possessed of superfluous wealth, going to reveal himself and endow us with such scholarships?

Our younger brethren, too, have been distinguishing themselves, and we offer our congratulations to A. R. Creese and A. H. Kerr in their being quite high up in the competitive entrance examination to Christ's Hospital. Rumour says that they were both in the first ten.

We are glad to note that operations have already commenced towards repairing the Fives Courts. For some little time now they have been in a state of dilapidation, and the middle buttress looked, as Mr. "Punch's" Irishman remarked, "as if someone had been leanin' agin it." Everything, however, should be in order by the Autumn term.
